LATEST NEWS

• The SMM noted a slight overall decrease in the level of violence in eastern Ukraine during the period from 26 June to 9 July. The situation, however, remained volatile, with violence erupting in a number of areas: SMM monitors at the Popasna forward patrol base recorded 100 mortar impacts around Popasna-Pervomaisk on 27 June, at least 50 artillery and 10 mortar rounds near Svitlodarsk on 28 June, and approximately 500 explosions in just three hours in Yasynuvata on 29 June.


Continued violence and potential escalation remain as the sides, at best, only
partially adhere to their commitments. The disengagement process remains
stalled with no progress made around the Stanytsia Luhanska bridge and an
increasing number of ceasefire violations recorded in and around the Zolote
disengagement area. Heavy weapons continue to be seen in violation of
withdrawal lines, with, for example, the SMM noting 10 multiple launch
rocket systems near so-called "LPR"-controlled Khrustalnyi on 6 July, and
self-propelled howitzers near government-controlled Novookhtyrka
on 8 and 9 July (four and two, respectively).

 The violence resulted in a number of civilian casualties with two people killed and eight injured during the period from 26 June to 9 July, most UXO/mine-related and one involving a child. This brings the total number of civilian casualties confirmed by the SMM in 2017 to 306, including 56 fatalities.

• The SMM's freedom of movement has remained restricted in multiple areas, in particular in border areas close to so-called "DPR"-controlled Novoazovsk, where armed men have systematically prevented the Mission from patrolling for the entire reporting period. Denial of access, in areas not controlled by the Government, has sometimes been accompanied by threats to the SMM with, for example, an armed so-called "DPR" member pointing a rifle at SMM monitors near Kreminets on 7 July.
