**STATEMENT BY  
THE DELEGATION OF THE RUSSIAN FEDERATION**

Distinguished Co-Chairpersons,

Allow us to make the following procedural comments.

We are indignant that the Swiss Chairmanship-in-Office and the Georgian Chairmanship of the Forum for Security Co-operation (FSC) arbitrarily – without consulting all the participating States – placed a confrontational and hostile item containing non-consensus wording on the agenda of this joint special meeting of the FSC and the Permanent Council.

The meeting topics here are being chosen by Western States solely to divert attention from their violations of international obligations, the growing problems of the Kyiv regime and the scaling up of the unlawful practice of pirate-like seizure of civilian vessels.

The very fact that today's meeting has been convened is a blatant display of cynicism in view of the complete lack of response on the part of Romania and its NATO allies to the terrorist attack carried out by the Kyiv regime against students in Starobelsk in the Lugansk People's Republic on 22 May this year. It is unacceptable that you are going along with this line. Last week, you failed to respond to the Russian Federation's request to convene a special meeting of the FSC and the OSCE Permanent Council on this matter. Instead, you are clearly supporting an anti-Russian propaganda campaign based on numerous fabrications, and are thereby treading underfoot the OSCE's credibility altogether.

We would remind you that the convening of meetings may not run counter to the provisions of the Chairmanship's mandate, which unambiguously obligates it to take the whole spectrum of opinions of participating States into account in its actions (Porto Ministerial Council Decision No. 8 of 2002). Both Chairmanships are failing to follow these tenets as they violate the Rules of Procedure of the OSCE. This attests to their inability to perform their functions in good faith, not least in the light of Georgia's bid to chair the Organization in 2027.

The Russian delegation considers inappropriate any attempts to use the exalted position of a chairing country to undermine the consensus basis of the OSCE's work. We call

upon the Swiss Chairmanship-in-Office and the Georgian FSC Chairmanship to adhere to the approaches to our Organization's work that have been agreed upon by all the participating States and to strictly abide by the Rules of Procedure.

We request that this statement be attached to the journal of today's joint special meeting of the FSC and the Permanent Council.

## **STATEMENT BY THE DELEGATION OF ROMANIA**

Chairpersons,

Please allow me to thank the Georgian Chairmanship of the Forum for Security Co-operation and the Swiss Chairmanship of the Permanent Council for convening this special joint meeting of the FSC and the Permanent Council, at short notice, regarding the recent circumstances involving my country.

This meeting complements, at a regional level, the special meeting of the UN Security Council organized yesterday to discuss the security implications of the violations of the airspace of Romania. It was for the first time in the 71 years since Romania is a member of the United Nations that we requested a special meeting of the Security Council to discuss the security concerns of Romania.

Foreign Minister Oana Țoiu stated yesterday in New York that repeated violations of European countries' airspace must not be treated as a "new normal" and that it is the shared responsibility of the international community to prevent the escalation of such actions. She also stated that we must do everything within our power, individually and collectively, to help stop the war at our border and to find a diplomatic path in this direction.

Dear colleagues,

First of all, allow me to restate the facts. During the night of 28 to 29 May 2026, while the Russian Federation launched another aggressive attack against civilian infrastructure in Ukrainian ports on the Danube, a Russian drone again breached the national airspace of Romania.

The drone entered Romanian national airspace at 1.52 a.m., flying for approximately four minutes and covering a distance of 10 kilometres over Romanian territory. However, due to risk calculations – considering the low altitude (between 100 and 500 metres), the trajectory of the drone, the limited time it spent in our airspace and the safety of civilians on the ground – it was impossible to engage and destroy the drone.

As a result of this drone crashing into a residential building in Galați, a densely populated urban centre, a mother and her 14-year-old son were injured. They are currently in

hospital receiving specialized medical assistance for burns. Two other individuals suffered injuries, and approximately 70 people were evacuated.

The incident on 29 May in Galați differs from airspace violations recorded since 2022, as this is the first time Romanian citizens have been injured. The intensifying trend is clear and we have warned about it. Let me remind you that on 25 April 2026 Romanian property – electricity poles and household annexes – was for the first time damaged in the same city by a Russian drone.

Let me be clear: all of this occurred against the backdrop of Russia's war of aggression against Ukraine.

Colleagues,

Our Russian colleagues frequently ask us to base our discussions on facts and to refrain from groundless accusations. We agree, so we turn once again to the facts.

You will find in your pigeonholes official photos of the remains of the drone that exploded on the night of 28 to 29 May 2026 in Galați. The images show the specific type of drone – a Geran-2 – including its serial numbers, identification labels, and engine. Our experts have confirmed, through a thorough analysis of its construction, graphics and physico-chemical elements, that this was unmistakably a Russian drone.

A Russian drone used to attack Ukraine. A Russian drone targeting civilian infrastructure. A Russian drone that crashed into an apartment building in Romania, detonating its entire explosive charge and injuring civilians outside of Ukraine.

The President of Romania, Nicușor Dan, has confirmed this, stating:

“The Russian Federation has committed a serious act that endangered the lives of Romanian citizens on Romanian soil. This is an escalation that cannot be accepted, will not be tolerated, and will not go unanswered. It is the result of Russia's irresponsible use of tactics with utter disregard for civilian lives. All of this is part of Moscow's arsenal to instil fear, undermine trust and cause harm.”

Consequently, the Supreme Council of National Defence of Romania has decided to close the Consulate of the Russian Federation in Constanța and declare the Russian consul in Constanța persona non grata. Additionally, it was decided to step up the necessary measures to enhance Romania's anti-air capabilities within the frameworks provided by NATO, the European Union, and bilateral co-operation with our partners.

On behalf of Romania, we would like to thank all our partners and friends who have expressed solidarity with the affected civilians, backed our diplomatic initiatives to hold Russia accountable, and announced new measures to support Romania. Thank you all.

Chairpersons,

The incident which occurred on 29 May in Romania is not isolated. There have been almost 50 violations of Romanian national airspace by Russian drones since the launch of Russia's war of aggression against Ukraine.

This time, once again, Romania's national airspace was breached, and Romania's national security was threatened. But Romania is not the only one. Only in the last few months, other countries have been putting similar incidents on the OSCE agenda – the Republic of Moldova, Poland, Estonia, Latvia – just to name a few.

All these irresponsible acts occur in the context of Russia's full-scale invasion against Ukraine, which has lasted already for the past 1,560 days, and follows the illegal annexation of the Crimean peninsula in 2014. Russia's war of aggression remains a constant source of insecurity and destabilization across the entire OSCE area. Through its reckless, cynical and irresponsible actions, Russia continuously violates the principles of international law, the UN Charter and the Helsinki Final Act. We all committed to uphold these principles, Russia included.

However, while Russia's aggression continues unabated, Moscow denies all responsibility for its actions and puts forward baseless claims:

- Russia claims these incidents are staged to distract public attention from a failing Ukrainian war effort. But we all see that Ukraine is successfully defending itself against a ruthless aggressor.
- Russia claims there is no clear evidence indicating Russia's responsibility. But there is undeniable proof that Russia is behind the violations of international law.
- Russia claims these incidents are NATO provocations to justify a war against Russia. But we have all seen that Russia is the one that started and chooses to continue this war of aggression.

The innocent civilian victims, the official photos of the drone fragments, and of the damage caused to the residential building in Galati, prove that the Russian allegations are blatant disinformation and cynicism.

Chairpersons,

The incident in Romania is an unprecedented and irresponsible act of escalation by the Russian Federation. We must be clear in attributing this event, exposing the perpetrator, and seeking accountability.

We call on Russia to cease its war of aggression against Ukraine, respect its sovereignty, territorial integrity and independence, and withdraw all its forces from the territory of Ukraine.

Let me conclude by emphasizing that Russia bears full responsibility for these acts. Russia started this war of aggression. Ukraine is legitimately defending itself in line with Article 51 of the United Nations Charter.

We will not be intimidated and we reiterate that our political, diplomatic, military and financial commitment to Ukraine remains unchanged as we pursue a just, enduring peace rooted in the UN Charter and the Helsinki Final Act.
